# UTAH STATE GOVERNMENT SPENDING ON RESTRICTED TECHNOLOGY



#### **FEBRUARY 2024**

#### \*Update\*

- On January 17, 2024, China Tech Threat (CTT) accessed <u>Transparent Utah</u>.
- The system reported that, since CTT'S last report, the state of Utah spent an additional \$2,631,049 in 2024, \$6,188,533 in 2023, and \$7,741,105 in 2022 on restricted Chinese technology from Lenovo, Inc. Additionally, CTT discovered Lexmark, Inc. purchases previously unreported, totaling \$63,548 between 2018 and 2023.
- Factoring in the updated numbers, the state of Utah spent a combined \$51,025,679 on restricted Chinese technology from Lenovo, Inc. and Lexmark, Inc. between 2018 and 2024.

#### **Recent Progress**

 On January 26, 2024, Representative Candice Pierucci introduced the Public Entity Restrictions bill, <u>HB 404</u>. Among other things, it prohibits procurement of technology or technology services, networks, or systems from restricted foreign entities, including China.

# **The Problem**

Chinese government-owned technology manufacturers Lenovo and Lexmark have been
restricted from U.S. military and intelligence agencies due to their connection to the
Chinese government and military. While federal policy directs information security at the
federal level, states must determine their own security standards making states
vulnerable to intrusion through the purchase of these risky Chinese technology

### **The Process**

 Originally, on August 16, 2022, CTT reached out to the Utah Department of Government Operations, Division of Purchasing and General Services, requesting documents relevant to purchases of Lexmark and Lenovo products and services. The Assistant Director of the Division of Purchasing provided the contract information on October 7, 2022. The contracts provided date from 2018 to 2021 (see CTT's prior <u>Fact</u> <u>Sheet</u>, dated February 2023).  However, purchases of restricted technology through third-party resellers, which can be significant, are not yet captured in our research. For example, the National Association of State Procurement Officers identifies the following <u>qualified resellers</u> in Utah: CDWG, SHI, Summit Partner, DHE, Trinity3 Technology, and Firefly. Any future efforts to identify and restrict purchases of Chinese-owned technology manufacturers should include resellers.
